Dr. Tiffany Willoughby-Herard is an Associate Professor of African American Studies with courtesy appointments in Political Science; Global and International Studies; and Comparative Literature at the University of California, Irvine. Willoughby-Herard is also Professor Extraordinarius in the Chief Albert Luthuli Research Research Chair in the College of Human Sciences (September 2021-August 2024) at the University of South Africa and the President of the National Conference of Black Political Scientists (54th Annual Conference March 9-11, 2023, Atlanta). Willoughby-Herard is a 2022-2023 National Humanities Center Fellow in Research Triangle Park, North Carolina. They are the 2021-2022 recipient of the campus' Academic Senate Distinguished Faculty Award for Mentorship, one of the most prestigious awards University of California professors can receive from their colleagues. Their poetry about the politics of African Politics in the discipline of political science was re-published in *Wild Imperfections: An Anthology of Womanist Poems* compiled and edited by Natalia Molebatsi with a foreword by Bernardine Evaristo (Cassava Republic Books, 2021); first published by Penguin Random House South Africa (2021).


In March 2021 she published "AICRE + Philosophy—Picking up a Dropped Stitch in the Humanities" for the Miami Institute for Social Science Inaugural Forum and in October 2020 she published "The Police Tackled Shikera C." for the Praxis Center: Arcus Center for Social Justice Leadership Blog edited by H.LT. Quan. She co-authored the preface entitled, "Unhushable Wit': Pedagogy, Laughter, and Joy in the Classrooms of Cedric J. Robinson," to the Revised and Updated Third Edition of Cedric J. Robinson's Black Marxism: The Making of the Black Radical Tradition with Damien Sojoyner (Penguin Edition 2021; University of North Carolina Press Edition 2020).

Willoughby-Herard co-authored her first ever Washington Post Op-Ed in response to the horrific domestic terror bomb threats at Historically Black Colleges and Universities in January and Feburary 2022. Willoughby-Herard and historian Jessica Millward are concluding their work in Summer 2022 as the co-principal investigators of the three-year Activist Studio West-University of California-Morgan State University graduate pathways research project. This work has catalyzed the successful recruitment of dozens of African,

Black, and Caribbean humanities doctoral and medical school students concerned with challenging and mitigating the institutionalized, structural, and material effects of racial terror in all of its dimensions.

Her co-writing groups have found colleagues completing writing projects, advancing in their careers, and walking in the dignity that our Ancestors have bequeathed to us as much beloved, cherished, fought for, and dreamt of African people. She's got four other forthcoming research articles.

Professor Kristen Monroe has published the article: "Something there is that doesn't love a wall. Understanding the Search for Peace in Aversive Circumstances by Analyzing the Political Psychology of Berlin Wall Crossers" with graduate student Ben Hoyt.

She has also working on the Journal of Transdisciplinary Peace Praxis during Summer 2022. Professor Monroe has authored two books: [18] *The Unspoken Morality of Childhood: Family, Friendship, Self-Esteem and the Wisdom of the Everyday*. Anthem

Press of Cambridge U Press. May 2022, and [19] When Conscience Calls: Moral Courage in an Age of Confusion and Despair. University of Chicago Press, in press. Additionally, she has currently completed five book chapters and have received several grants.

The Ethics Center Summer Mentoring Program received over 300 applicants again this year from all around the world and Professor Monroe worked in developing two additional modules to accommodate all applicants before closing applications in mid-April. The program has 9 modules on (1) science and moral reflection (two sessions), (2) moral courage, (3) political resilience, (4) the pseudoscience of race and ethnicity, (5) the deceptive social hologram, (6) political violence and memory, (7) the Ukrainian crisis, and (8) human rights. The summer interns are great to work with and Professor Monroe would like to encourage other faculty to offer a module on their research in 2023, where we again will be online.

Congratulations to Ben Raynor who just had his article, "The Shadow of Sanctions: Reputational Risk, Financial Reintegration and the Political Economy of Sanctions Relief" published by the European Journal of International Relations (June 7th, 2022).

The article addresses under-examined dynamics related to why some countries successfully recover from economic sanctions while others do not. It finds, paradoxically, that the reputational dynamics built into US financial sanctions, making them particularly impactful, are the same dynamics that prevent targeted economies from returning to pre-sanction growth and foreign direct investment.


